QUERY CORNER

Referring to John Guy's query in Czechout 2.86 it appears that this cancellation was made by a Group in Germany. Bob Black asks about 3 essays that appeared in Slovakia, prepared by A. Holleho dated 1944. The 1.40k in red shows a dove and axe; the 2.50k dark blue depicts a knife piercing a German Helmet, and the 2.50k light blue shows a Partisan in the mountains. Each essay bears the legend - 'Ceskoslovensko.' Information of this interesting item has been discovered in a publication "The Encyclopaedia of the Slovak National Uprising" This commemorates the event that took place on the 29 August 1944, following an appeal broadcast on the Radio in Banska Bystrica "We appeal to you, stand up and resist the German occupation forces. Fight hard and relentlessly against the intruders."

Referring to Slovakia - we shall be interested to see any replies in answer to James Negus' query on the differing dates of issue for Commemoratives mentioned in Czechout 2.86. Replies please to the new Editor, Alan Knight, address on the front page.

Referring to Bob Blacks remarks on the Czech Patriotic Marks in Czechout 2.86, Alan Knight wrote an article on these stamps in Czechout 3.81.

A Letter from Peter Collins, Editor of 'The Stamp Lover' journal of The National Philatelic Society, and 'The Philatelist' published by Robson Lowe; concerning a Czech document which was on offer at the RL Auction in Bournemouth during October.

The attached is a Czech document which we recently offered at auction. It is a receipt for tax (as you will readily recognise)! and it has been suggested that it may be the oldest known Czech printing? You may have some comment?

A rough translation:

Total

We, Gregory Biri of Kriglstein, Canon of the Cathedral Church of St Vitus on the Hradcany in Prague, and of the Metropolitan Church of St Peter and Paul on the Visehrad, and in Stara Boleslav, Doctor of Sacred Scripture; Jaroslav Florian Svihovsky, Lord of Risinburg and Svihov, of Nalzovy, Cejkovy, Neprachovy, Krutenice and Tedrajci, Privy Councillor to His Roman Imperial Majesty and King of Hungary and Bohemia, etc.; Albrecht Vaclay Hlozek of Zampach, Judge of HIM's District Court and Captain of the Royal City of Prague, etc.; jiri Jan Reysman of Risenburg, HIM's Councillor, Primate of the Krakovsky Old Town of Prague and Principal Commander of the Watch, of the Municipal Company - the four gentlemen designated as Principal Tax Collectors for the City of Prague by the law of 24 April 1690 (?). We give receipt for:



THE SOCIETY DISPLAY AT BRITISH PHILATELIC EXHIBITION 14-19 October 1986

The Supplement to "Czechout 3:86" publicised the Society's forthcoming display at BPE with a promise of something not to be missed. The statement was indeed well justified!

The assembly of material received much acclaim by the steady flow of visitors, and later in the week we were honoured by a visit from the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) Overseas Radio Service, who wished to broadcast a feature on the exhibits in their Czech language programme. This, in fact went out on Saturday 18 October, and although only of a little over five minutes duration highlighted the Society itself and described in some detail the background to the material on show.

Our 900 sheets were very varied and covered a wide spectrum of Czechoslovak philately, with a mounting plan designed to give a chronological sequence to the display without any pretence that it was a complete coverage of the total time span.

Our Honorary Life President, $\underline{\text{Mrs Kay Goodman}}$ (KG), set the scene with a selection of forerunner material, with an introductory narrative - a mine of information in support of the material displayed.

During the Middle Ages, the Kingdom of Bohemia was a major power in Central Europe. Eventually with the passing of King Wenceslas, the area together with the lands of Moravia and Silesia came under the Hapsburgs. From 1790 the official language was German and Czech. Slovakia on the other hand still belonged to Hungary (the Crown of St. Stephen), but in 1867 the whole of Hungary also passed to the Hapsburgs.

The table of postal rates from 1526 to 1850 that prefaced the display helped the viewer to appreciate the displayed material, which illustrated the development of the postal system with stampless entires 1644, 1785/6, 1790, 1822 and through to 1850. From 1850 use of adhesives was obligatory, and this was illustrated by use of stamped forerunner material through to 1896.

Mr Alan Knight (AK), provided a brief insight into the military mails of the 1914-18 war, which clearly showed the part played by the Czechs in these troubled areas of conflict. Just how complex this was was is clear from the various types and origins of the Field Cards, the cancellations of both Austrian (K u K Feldpostamt), and Hungarian (Tabori Post); cachets of Military units, Red Cross cards and Prisoner of War mail, all added to the understanding of the period.

The contribution from Mr Brian Parker (BP), was in many ways a continuation of the forerunner material, but confined to a study of the cancellations of Prague. The exhibit traced the development of the cancellations from 1850 to 1910 with the initial postmarks of unilingual style in the German language, and the change in 1871 to use of German and Czech, but with German "superiority" the Czech being confined to the lower half of the cancellation. It was not until 1898 that a compromise situation was achieved which authorised "equality" with the German & Czech spellings side by side.

Our President Mrs Kay Goodman (KG), also provided a taste of her International award winning material of the Czechoslovak Fieldpost in Siberia, starting with the Russian issues. The Legion of some 80,000 men formed during the 1914-18 war from Czechs and Slovaks in Russia, marched across Russia and Siberia after the 1917 revolution. The Czech Fieldpost operated from September 1918, linking up the units along the Trans-Siberian railway.

The display included essays for the proposed definitive issue of 1919-20 and also described the six types of the three designs of the issued stamps. A study of the 'Lion' issue and it's surcharges, together, together with a selection of cancellations of the period gave a good cross-section of another very inter-

-esting facit of the history and postal history of the area.

Mrs Yvonne Wheatley (YW), in what may be described as her first love (philatelically that is!!) the Hradcany issues, presented a 72 sheet display covering all 14 values in their various types. Backed up with black prints, essays, proofs, colour trials, postal stationery, and the usage of the various values. Enough to whet the appetite of any specialist and an eye-opener to the uninitiated, without the inclusion of the dubious "printers waste" so frequently offered as 'Trial printings.'

Mr John Whiteside (JW), provided an insight to a further area of military history with a selection of the Field Post cancellations used in Slovakia from January 1919 to July 1920. Immediately after the Independence in 1918 there was considerable unrest in the eastern provinces of Slovakian Ruthenia, which had been previously Hungarian lands. Czech army units were moved to the area to deal with the situation. The mail items shown described the four different types of cancellations and showed cachets of the military units, together with examples of civilian mail, that received the attention of the censor.

The exhibit of the 1920 Masaryk issue from Mr Ernst Gorge (EG) really had to be seen to be appreciated to the full. The vast range of designs, both adopted and unadopted, with trial printings, proofs, essays, colour trials, culminating in the three values of the issued stamp, and their use, showed quite clearly the lengths to which the authorities were prepared to go to produce what was considered an acceptable design. Surely a unique display.

A selection of the issues of the First Republic was shown by our Chairman, Mr Reginald Hounsell (RH), with a study of the 'Dove' "Chainbreaker" and the 'Agriculture & Science' designs with the various printing errors, proofs, essays, colour trials etc., following through with the First Anniversary of the Republic; Red Cross Surcharges; Hussites; National Anthem; The 1936/7 Views and Castles including some die proofs; ending with the 1939 Slovakian Parliament overprints.

An additional display by Mr Ernst Gorge (EG), covered the 1926 issues of Masaryk, with their various watermark varieties, and the changed dies of the 1Kr value. The overprinted issues for the Sokol movement and the Olympics were also included with the seldom seen trial overprint in black on the 300Kr. (actually issued with a red overprint.)

The postal history of the Sokol movement was the subject chosen by our Vice Chairman, Mr Brian Day (BD) which traced the commemorations through from the 5th Sokol in 1907 to the 11th in 1948, all illustrated by special cancellations, postal stationery and illustrated post-cards. The Sokol movement began in 1862, as a gymnastic movement during the Austro-Hungarian Empire and it spread throughout the Slav countries. The Sokol displays were large regimented gymnastic displays which finally became a Czechoslovak patriotic movement.

Postage Due labels and their associated instructional markings are generally a much neglected subject in philately, but not so by Mr John Whiteside (JW)whose display with a wealth of research and information covered many uses of the need to surcharge postal communications. Underpaid internal mails with the use of the provisional Postage Dues on Hradcany issues, Incoming underpaid foreign mail; redirected mail from Germany, together with the more unusual uses e.g. the collection of dues on Poste Restante mail, Official mail requiring the recipient to pay at a single rate, and a system of shared postage on similar mails.

Mr Ronald Hollis (RH2) gave us a taste of the postal history surrounding the occupation period of 1939-45 with an introduction showing a 'time-table' of the share-out of the Czechoslovak territories, then very well illustrated by mails

from Sudetenland; the Polish occupation of Teschen; Hungarian occupation of Carpatho-Ukraine; Southern Czechoslovakia; Slovakia; Bohemia and Moravia.

Another second world war exhibit from <u>Mr Alec Page</u> (AP) traced the initial escape of the exiles from Czechoslovakia and their assembly into fighting units at Camp d'Agde in Southern France. Their involvement in the fight to save France before their final defeat in 1940, and the subsequent evacuation to England. Their postal activities in England until their eventual return into Europe and back to their homeland in 1945, all illustrated by postal items and supporting documentation.

The liberation of Czechoslovakia was covered by Mr Cyril Wackett (CW) with an array of material, mostly of local origin. During the war apart from the underground movement, the Czechoslovaks had a liberation movement. The idea being that as soon as the lands were liberated from the German occupation, the stamps which then existed would be overprinted with either a slogan or the coat of arms of individual towns. Many stamps were so treated including the Bohemia and Moravia protectorate issues, the German stamps in use in Sudetenland and both Hungarian stamps and the special Slovakian stamps printed for the occasion. The majority of the overprints were authorised by the local National Committees and were postally used for only a very short time in 1945. (Three to ten days.)

The progression of the liberated Czechoslovak nation towards normality also necessitated removing all traces from the postal system of the previous years of occupation. Apart from the six new postage stamp issues in the first year, the existing cancellers and supporting instructional labels/stamps were either withdrawn, expurged and replaced with temporary alternatives. A second display by Mr Alec Page (AP) illustrated the various methods used to remove the German language from the cancellations; registration labels and airmail etiquettes, and to eventually provide replacements of unilingual design.

The development of the conveyance of mail by air was covered in an extensive joint display by Messrs Reginald Hounsell and Brian Parker, which showed the first provisional airmail stamps including the trial overprints. The later airmail stamps were also well covered. Carried mail illustrated clearly the extension of the services through to 1950, both internally and externally. The incoming mail, acceptances and material marking the introduction of new routes showed how the modern handling of mail by air has been achieved — now taken for granted by most.

Modern Czechoslovak stamps are renowned for their artistic designs and for their production, and this came through well with the display of "Art on Czechoslovak Stamps" produced by Mrs Lindy Knight (LK). The stamps covered many art subjects such as Children's art; Folk art; the Art of the Baroque period; the 9th Century; Gothic and Renaissance periods, and such other subjects as ceramics and modern glassware. The display also showed that a fine team of artists, designers and engravers are called upon in the production of modern Czechoslovak stamps.


Lastly but by no means least, the family team of Mrs Yvonne Gren (YG) and Mr Frederick Gren (FG), our Honorary Secretary and Librarian respectively provided us with a display of the souvenirs, special stamp issues etc; in support of the various National and International Stamp Exhibitions held in Czechoslovakia from 1937 to 1978. And so on to 1988 the next International in Prague.

This report would not be complete without including a few words of thanks, firstly to our hard working Hon. Secretary, Mrs Yvonne Gren, who was responsible for the co-ordination of the displays; also to the small band of helpers who






1919 Czech. Field Post in Siberia - two line cancellation with mixed franking. (KG)

Gummed paper 11 x 9.5 cm




1920. Masaryk. (EG) Letter-press Die Proof. Enlarged size - 5 x 7 cm.






(YW) (Illustration - actual size)





The early 17th century saw more turmoil with the start of the 30 Years War in Europe between Catholics and Protestants. The Battle of the White Mountain (1620) witnessed Protestant defeat with nobility and citzens perishing. However, Art flourished during the 17th and 18th centuries with 'foreign' baroque art taking on a Bohemian face. Many foreign artists visited the Czech Lands – some dying there – for many years. Some, purely Czech artists became well-known abroad as they spread the fame of Czech Art.

AN EXTRACT FROM THE FIRST PAGE OF OUR PRESIDENT'S Exhibit

The Territories comprising the Czechoslovak Republic as it existed up to 1918 were all part of the Austrian Hungarian Empire.

In the middle ages the Kingdom of Bohemia was a major power in Central Europe. With the passing of the 'Jagello House' the "Lands and Crown of St Wenceslas" (the Kingdom of Bohemia), the Margravey of Moravia and the Duchies of Silesia came under the rule of the Hapsburg House. The official language was German and Czech was used officially from 1790.

Slovakia belonged to Hungary (the lands of the 'Crown of St Stephen'). In 1539 parts came under the Hapsburg rule; the rest gradually from Turkish rule until 1867 when all Hungary was ruled by the Hapsburgs. In the 1830's the official language was latin.

Postal Periods:

- 1526 1622 Imperial Hapsburg system (some Postmasters from the Thurn and Taxis family.)
- 1622 1722 Courts of Paar Imperial Postmasters.
- 1722 1788 Imperial Postal monopoly re-established (Period 1) Special rates for mail, postage based on weight and three distances. During this period rate markings and marks of origin gradually became obligatory.
- 1788 1817 Postal Mail (Period 2) Hapsburg Crown Lands. Uniform rate introduced basic rate $\frac{1}{2}$ loth (7.5 grammes). Half postage paid by each sender and addressee. Basic full rate: 8 kreuzer from 1788: 12 kr. from 1798. 16 kr. from 1803: 24 kr. from 1806. Use of postmarks faded out as unified rate eliminated need to show place of mailing. In 1810 two zone system introduced and postage rates increased due to inflation.
- 1817 1838 Postal Mail (Period 3) A system of seven zones introduced with basic rates for 12 kr. to 14 kr. paid either by sender or addressee. Cancel of Post Office of despatch again compulsory to establish and check proper postage paid. Official Mail was given franking rights for half postage. If not having franking rights, the other half to be paid by the addressee.
- 1838 -- 1842 Postal Mail (Period 4) New Postal Act separated the Imperial Mails from Royal Hungarian Mails. Date of mailing included in the postmark. Seven zone system still in operation.
- 1842 1848 Postal Mail (Period 5) System altered to two zones above and below ten miles. Local 2 kr. rate retained. In 1843 first zone increased to 20 miles and special $1\frac{1}{4}$ rate (9 kr.) introduced for letters in envelopes.
- 1848 1850 Postal Mail (Period 6) Postal mail below ten miles reduced to 3 kr.

On 1st June 1850 adhesive postage stamps were introduced and made compulsory for prepayment of ordinary letters in the Hapsburg Crown Lands.

NOTE FROM THE PRO: In my write-up for the philatelic press, I omitted all references to frame Numbers 71-80 at the Society BPE Exhibition. This affected the exhibits from members Alec Page and Cyril Wackett. I do not recall how this happened BUT I do most sincerely apologise for this omission on my part. To-date the only Report published has appeared in 'STAMP NEWS.' Alan Knight.
