MIDPEX '97 Tile Hill, Coventry, 28 June 1997

Everyone who attended this exhibition for national and specialist philatelic societies agreed that it was a very successful day, and that the previous one in 1995 was not a "flash in the pan". The many dealers present seemed pleased with the specialist audience. Plans are already being made for MIDPEX'99.

Space limited representation to sixty societies of truly diverse character. It gave our Society the opportunity of liaising with others concerned with overlapping interests, given the historic fluidity of borders in central Europe. 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Obltuary

<u>Gerry Bater FRPSL</u>: We read with sadness in the *ABPS NEWS* for July of the death of Gerry Bater suddenly on 4 April. It was during the Worthing PGBS Congress in 1978 that Gerry, who was editor of *The Overprinter*, the journal of the GB Overprints Society, suggested we rename our CPSGB Bulletin *'Czechout.'* Gerry was an enthusiastic philatelist, a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society, and first County representative of Somerset and Dorset, being one of the leaders responsible in 1990 for the South Western 'Royal' group which continues to meet twice yearly. He published handbooks on the G.B. Waterlow issues of both KGVI and QEII, and had just completed a series of articles on the 1939-48 GB high values. Gerry Bater had also developed a philatelic photographic service, which he demonstrated at one of the Congresses. He will be much missed by his many friends.

Reg Hounsell writes "I wish to gauge the interest in Czechoslovak Postcards amongst our Society members (postally used or collected for the picture side). In addition I would wish to put together a 'mini' catalogue or guide to collecting Czech postcards, eg. one similar to the publications for British and American topographical and other theme cards. It is not intended to include "Official Cards" i.e. postal stationery, and those related which are already well covered by existing philatelic publications.

I therefore seek the help of other members to build a list of publishers, artists and subjects, plus lists of cards where a number sequence may exist. A list from other members on their cards, publishers and perceived rarity, especially the Art Cards depicting Czechoslovak costumes and customs, would be helpful.

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I would also like to establish the earliest postal use of some items, especially where the postmark relates to the town [topographical] or the event. Specifically I "challenge" members to help identify earliest known posting dates of the various 'Gruss Aus' & "Pozdrav z" view cards. I have a large number of privately published postcards in my collection, many of which have been postally used, which I have grouped into the following subject matters:-

Artist (coloured view cards) Czech Legion in Siberia/Russia/France & Italy Exhibitions (excluding SOKOL) General Topographical [hand coloured, Black & white single & multiple views] German Occupation period Gruss Aus & Pozdrav z cards National Costumes, e.g. events, festivals etc. where local costumes are worn People Publicity cards [Artist] Publicity cards [General] Real Photo cards (events) Real Photo cards (Topographical) Special events

BOOK REVIEWS

Glossary of Philatelic Terminology, by Ludvik Z. Svoboda, Compiled and edited by Jolana Machalek. The Society for Czechoslovak Philately, Inc. 1996. 128 pages, Card cover & Comb binding in large format 28 x 22cm.

Last year, our friends across the Atlantic, the Society for Czechoslovak Philately published an extensive glossary as an attempt to provide assistance to the non-Czech/Slovak speaking/reading collector, to enable better use to be made in researching source information.

The Foreword to the Glossary emphasises that it is <u>not</u> a translation dictionary but a translated listing of frequently encountered philatelic and everyday terms. Likewise, as an aid to the use of Czech/Slovak catalogues the Table of Contents, Designations and Numbering System of the 1988 Handbook (Specializovaná Přiručka) is also included in a side by side translation.

Separate sections are devoted to what is described as Thematic Terms, under headings of Colours, Months, Days, Numbers etc. A multi-section on Military Terms and finally Continents and Countries completes this part of the book. It is, as would be expected in two parts Czech/Slovak to English and vice-versa. Careful study of the Foreword by the author Ludvik Z Svoboda a Past-President and currently the editor of the *Czechoslovak Specialist* facilitates easy use of the glossary.

Certainly by far the most extensive of the several previously published books/pamphlets <u>geared to the English language</u> collector. [U.K. members wishing to obtain copies of the Glossary should contact the Publications Officer (address inside front cover of *Czechout*) who can order in bulk from America. The current cost cannot be determined but will be in the range of £12.50 to £15 [plus postage/packing £1.50]. To avoid multi-ordering from America, this offer will remain open only until the end of September.

Slovenští Letci/Slovak Airmen 1939-1941 by Jiří Rajlich & Jiří Sehnal, 64 page A4 softback, 1991, UK price £6.95 + pp £1.50 from Midland Counties Publications, Unit 3 Maizefield, Hinckley Fields, Hinckley, Leicester, LE10 1YF

This useful study with its bilingual Slovak/English text covers the history of aviation in Slovakia during the lifetime of the 1939/1945 puppet state. Inevitably most of the text is concerned with military aviation but there is also a useful guide to the limited activity in the field of commercial aviation.

The Slovak Air Force was formed immediately after partition and was based on the former Air Regiment No 3 of Czechoslovak Air Force which had been based on Slovak territory at Pieštany. Nearly 300 aircraft of variable quality were available to the Slovaks. The Slovak Air Force was soon in action in the east in a number of border skirmishes with Hungarian forces. After the loss to Slovakia of the airfield at Košice, the main base in the east was that of Spišská Norá Ves. In September 1939, the Slovak Air Force joined in the German attack on Poland, but only in a very limited way. At the same time as this limited action, other Slovak airmen had decided that their future lay with the Western powers and eventually succeeded in making their way first to Poland or France, later to England and Russia. The authors note that nearly 40 Slovak airmen lost their lives while flying with the RAF.

The authors continue their story by describing the growth of the Slovak Air Force and the actions on the Russian Front. By early 1944 the Slovak fighters were in action against American bombers, but by the late summer of that year, the Slovak National Uprising had broken out and a *Combined Flight* dedicated to the uprising was located at Tri Duby between Zvolen and Banská Bystrica. With the end of the uprising some flew their planes to Russia to continue the fight, others took to the hills as

partisans. However, as the war neared the end, Slovaks flying from the advancing Russian front continued to make their contribution to the final defeat of the Germans and were well represented at the eventual victory celebrations in Prague.

As far as commercial aviation is concerned it is noted that a Slovak Air Company was formed on 19 June 1939, but it was only possible to open a line from Bratislava to Vienna by agreement with *Deusche Lufthansa* who supplied Ju 86 planes and German crews at various times. Later, a Stinson Reliant and an Airspeed Envoy (ex CSA?) were purchased with the aim of operating an internal service from Bratislava to Spišská Nová Ves via Pieštany and Tri Duby, but the line never opened. In 1943 two FW 58C *Weihe* (Kite) aircraft were obtained to operate Bratislava-Vienna and Bratislava-Tri Duby-Prešov. This route remained in operation until 30 September 1943, but the changing war situation put an end to any further 'commercial' activities.

This booklet contains a wide-ranging selection of black and white photographs in rather grainy reproductions plus a large number of well produced colour representations of the principal military and civil planes mentioned in the text, including RAF planes flown by Slovak crews. Several statistical tables and a map showing the location of Slovak air bases complete this valuable record of a complicated and ever-changing story.

CZECH AND SLOVAK STAMP BOOKLETS ISSUED SINCE 1.1.93

Booklets

I have been collecting new issues and FDCs for the first time in decades. The trigger to this revived interest was the creation of the two new stamp issuing countries of the Czech Republic and Slovakia on 1.1.93. Not long after that date, I signed up with a UK new issue dealer who specialised in Central and Eastern Europe for all the Czech and Slovak new issues. Now, writing at the end 1996, I'm a little surprised at the volume of material which has reached me over the last four years!

That material included a goodly selection of stamp booklets, which do not seem to have received much attention in *Czechout*. Two tabulated lists are presented here in the hope that some members may be interested in these booklet issues and with the hope that more knowledgeable members may well be able to make corrections and additions to the listing and <u>confirm or deny</u> the official status of these issues. Of course, the author is in no position to guarantee the completeness of these lists.

As far as the Slovak booklets are concerned they are generally restricted to commemorative or other special issues with a booklet print run between 5,000 and 10,000 copies. 15 out of the 16 different booklets seen by me, bear the logo of the Slovak Post Office on the reverse side.

I have seen 48 different booklets from the Czech Republic. Print runs for commemorative items vary between 5,000 and 12,000 booklets, with between 5,000 and 300,000 booklets produced for definitive issues. One or two oddities have been noted For example, three of the booklets issued for the >


founders of the Liberated Theatre, all contain stamps of the same face value, but Voskovec was given a 10,000 print run, Ježek and Werich only 5,000 each! The 1994 Christmas issue ran to 120,000 booklets, but only 18,000 were issued for Christmas 1995 and 19,000 for Christmas 1996. Note that some of 1993 and 1994 definitives have up to four different booklet cover designs per value. Of the 48 Czech booklets seen, 37 included printed references to Ceská Pošta, seven earlier issues refer to HÚP Praha and the final four appeared to have been issued by the regional postal authorities in Pilsen. All comments welcome via the Editor. (Can anyone explain the initials HÚP?)





THE PROBLEMS OF POSTAGE DUE AND POSTAL STATIONERY

Liberation Issues

Robert Hill

Following the liberation of the country, until the issue of 1 May 1946 (see figure 1), there were no Czechoslovakia postage due stamps officially available.

The German stamps utilised in the former Sudetenland area were not used after the Liberation overprints ceased to be valid at various dates around mid-May 1945.




Figure 3 Commercial cover sent from Chomutov to Ostrava. Rubber pink canceller CHOMUTOV 1 1945. Dumb black canceller 23.8.45. Pink boxed defaced (German legend removed) bilingual Doplatné with black manuscript 1.80, this represents a postage due deduced from the postage rate of 1.20 + 50% surcharge.

The former Protectorate of Bohemia & Moravia, where Postage Due were withdrawn on 1 November 1942 and no longer valid from 1 April 1943, had issued other stamps, but these were demonetised on 15 May 1945. In the short term a defaced (German legend removed) cachet was used for both normal postage paid in cash (see figure 2) and postage due (see figures 3 and 4) although the use of normal postage stamps for postage due purposes is also known. Other types of cachet exist for postage paid in cash.

Cachet in violet is the defaced (German legend removed) Protectorate bilingual type. Doplatné and in pencil -80, the local letter rate up to 30.XI.45.

The hand stamp was used to denote both amounts paid in cash and postage due, this is an example of a cover paid in cash (deduced from the rate).

Black and white postcard of Liberec Town Square, sent to an address in Pardubice. Cancelled at LIBEREC 3 18.IX.45 with First Republic canceller (type M47). The German legend on the card has been over stamped in violet with a cachet to the effect that old stock is being used up. Boxed pink defaced (German legend removed) bilingual Doplatné with blue crayon 90, this represents a postage due, deduced from the postcard rate of 60h + 50% surcharge.

The situation in Slovakia was somewhat different "POVERENI 'CTVO POŠT" (Executive Post Office) permitted the use of all stamps, including the issues of the former Republic of Slovakia, until 30 September 1947. Some of the values were, of course, used up quickly and by August 1945 "POVERENI 'CTVO POŠT" allowed combinations of lower values to be used. The postage due 1.60(Mi 33) was used as value 1.50 without overprint or manuscript change. Overprinting of Slovakian stamps was not obligatory although Postage Due and Postal Stationery exists with the straight line hand overprint of ČESKOSLOVENSKO (see figures 5 thru 8).

To summarise, the situation regarding Postage Due and other related items after the 1945 Liberation was:

Bohemia & Moravia

- 1. Postage due stamps were replaced by postage stamps from the Protectorate area until 15 May 1945.
- 2. Postage due was paid by cash from 16 May 1945 thru 10 September 1945 as a matter of course. At certain locations this was permissible until 30 November 1945, after this date the practice was illegal however, some did still pay cash in hand (see figure 9).
- 3. Postage due was then achieved by the use of Czechoslovakian stamps from 1 December 1945 until the new Postage Due stamps were issued on 1 May 1946.

Addressed to the Tax Office in Chrudim. Postage paid 1.20 and cancelled HERMNÚV MESTEC 17.1.46 with defaced (German legend removed) bilingual canceller. Boxed red defaced bilingual Dolplatné with manuscript blue crayon 240. The correct postage was 2.40. The deficit was 1.20 + 100%. The 100% deficiency rate applied from 1 December 1945.

Slovakia

- 1. After Liberation, postage due was paid by Republic of Slovakia issues from 1939, 1940 and 1942. From 1 September 1945 the 1.60 value was used as 1.50 face value.
- 2. Postage due was also paid with Postage stamps from the new Czechoslovakia. These are known in combination with the Slovakian postage dues.
- 3. Postage due was then paid by the issue of 1 May 1946 until 30 September 1947.
- 4. Postage due was also paid in cash.

VISIT TO THE CZECH POSTAL MUSEUM - PRAHA

I had two hours to spare during a recent visit to the beautiful city of Praha and having already visited the postal museum at Vyšší Brod, I thought it was high time I called in at the museum on Nové mlýny. The building is beautiful with murals by the Czech painter Josef Navrátil.

The ground floor is taken up with a comprehensive collection of Czech material, which is displayed in suspended frames, including:

I took photos of these but I have not yet mastered my new camera as I am still getting light bounce. Also present on the ground floor are stamps from other countries of the world. This was quite interesting but no more than one would expect.

Moving up to the first floor there is an exhibition related to Rudolf II. Praha is teaming with displays about this man, the halls around Hradčany and throughout the city have various parts of the display and the current CSA flight magazine also carries a lengthy feature. The special exhibition guide is in Czech and English and illustrates detail from the exhibition which covers the period 1550 thru 1678.

Items seen included:

- Rudolf II mandate from 1577
- Imperial letters personally signed by Maxmilian II (1571) and Rudolf II (1594)
- 1620 map of Czech lands by the Dutchman Janzoon
- Letters from Rudolf's successors Mathias II (1611), Ferdinand III (1652) sent to the Mayor and Councillors of Kolín and concerning the appointment of a Sub Chamberlain, Leopold I (1678)

Personally I found the book on postal distances of 1623 the most interesting, it was a reprint of a 1608 publication showing all European postal stations with the added information that - 1 post = 2 postal miles = between 15 and 20 kilometers.

It was okay but not nearly as interesting or informative as my trip to Vyšší Brod.

The museum is open daily, except Mondays, 0900 thru 1700 and the entrance fee was 15Kč. It is just around the corner from two stamp shops on Klimentská.

NOT IN THE TROJAN CATALOGUEI -Brian Day-

It is of interest that the 1939-1940 New York World's Fair Overprints do not appear in the latest Trojan catalogue. "After the Tempest of Wrath Has Passed, The Rule of The Country Will Return to Thee, O Czech People" - these words uttered by Comemius, a Czech refugee from Germanic oppression three hundred years ago, were sculptured on the white facade of the Czechoslovak Pavilion at the New York World's Fair.

When the Germans invaded Prague the Pavilion stood unfinished and for two years the Pavilion was maintained by donations, not only from American-Czechoslovaks, but thousands of freedom loving people from around the world. One of the money raising campaigns was the overprinting of souvenir sheets, wholly donated by stamp dealers and sold at the Pavilion.

On June 10th, 1939, the officials of the Czechoslovak Pavilion at the Fair, with the consent of the Czechoslovak Government in exile, and the authorisation of the President of the Czechoslovak Republic, Dr Eduard Beneš, overprinted the souvenir sheets. These sheets were not valid for postage.

"WHAT?. WHEN?. WHERE?" - Members' Queries -

Another selection, together with some answers, for which we are sure our inquirers will be grateful; the answers first.

Re lan McQueen's query in Czechout 2/97 page 44.

<u>From Richard Beith</u>: The 'directional' cachet: I have one example of this used on an internal letter with the destination "M Lázne". The *Praha 1* cds is for 12 September 1927. When I obtained this cover one Stampex, (ex-Whiteside?) there was a hand written note included stating that this cachet was used from June 1927 until airmail etiquettes were introduced on 1.4.28. However the cover to Paris shown on page 44 was posted on 3.4.28 and bears a *Létadlem/Par Avion* etiquette apparently making the cachet redundant?

<u>From John Whiteside:</u> In my airmail collection that I disposed of many years ago, I had at least two items bearing cachets of this type. I was always a bit uncertain about them because one was on a totally philatelic postcard, without message, created by a known creator of odd airmail items, Lt. Hukl, while the other was also a contrived item. I was a bit concerned therefore that the cachet might have been an unofficial production.

But this cover looks to be above reproach. The total fees paid are 8.50, which is, I think, correct for a registered airmail cover, weight 20-40g., postage of 2.50 for the first 20g., then 1.50 per further 20g., registration of 2.50 and air fee to France of 2 x 1.00 per 20g. This was, as far as I am aware, the air fee to France from 1925 onwards.

Another point about the cover is that there is an endorsement in Czech between the first two lines of the address. The first word starts, I think with V and the second word is "letadlem". I think this may mean that the cover was not carried by air, which may account for the fact that the only backstamp is an Epinay arrival. A Praha 7 or Praha 82 Letište or even a Paris Avion mark might be expected. Perhaps the directional air cachet was applied and then it was found that it could not catch a plane, so it was sent surface. I am by no means sure that this is correct, but it would be nice to be able to read the endorsement.

Re Alec Page's query in Czechout 2/98 page 45.

<u>From Richard Beith:</u> The first flight to the USA by Imperial Airways [Southampton-Foynes-Botwood-Montreal-New York] did not take place until 5 August 1939, using the Short's S30 G-AFCV *Caribou*. As this cover was franked at 6.50Kč, strongly suggest this was 2.50Kč for registration plus 4.00Kč for air mail to England, thence by sea. <u>Nobody was flying air mail across the North Atlantic in April 1939</u>. Of course this cover, if correctly dated 1.4.39, comes from the early Protectorate period. Are there any signs of currency control markings?

Three new Queries:

<u>From Jim Ansell:</u> I have a cover, apart from the stamps, identical to one illustrated in Mervyn Benford's book *The Visszatért Period in Hungarian Philately* on page 26, without a caption. I have however, been unable to identify Taksony on any map, although I bought it as a Carpatho-Ukraine item. [*Editor: I have a similar cover which is illustrated with Jim's below.*] Jim wrote to Mervyn "The Gazetteer of places, Appendix 6 of your publication lists Takcsany, (Stakcin) and Taksonyfalva, (Taksan). Can you please identify - none of the maps I have seen have Taksonyfalva on them, but my Czech & Slovak Republic map dated 1993/4 has Stakcin located about 20 kms inside Slovak territory and not in the Ukraine.

<u>Mervyn Benford</u> replied as follows: "The Hungarian cancellation is quite clear TAKSONY. This is a quite different word from TAKCSANY. I have recently acquired a major gazetteer listing all the places that once were Hungarian with bi-lingual reverse indices. Both Takcsany and Taksonfalva are listed. The latter is given as Slovak Matuskovo, if that helps you locate it. Taksony on its own is not listed either in Slovak or what later became Soviet parts of old Hungary. This latter was in POZSONY >



country, ie., western Slovakia, now Bratislava region, and rather out of the way for the 1939 action. The town of POZSONY had not returned in 1938. The history was that in 1939 Hungary annexed Ruthania but it also marched into a thin border slice of what still remained, even after 1938, Czech. There was fighting even, and air activity. There were minor border corrections and adjustments, all undone in the 1946 treaties. But maybe if TAKSONY was anything to do with TAKCSANY, just 20km inside the Slovak border, there could be a connection, with a locally-inspired 'liberation' series of flown covers based on getting Hungarian control back, albeit briefly.

But that implies a link between the two names, either linguistic or geographical for which I have no evidence. My other historical gazetteer of Hungary quotes TAKSONY as an alternative version of TAKSONYFALVA anyway. I think we have a cover which seems odd. If it originates in the Bratislava region, why Hungarian stamps and postmarks, and why 1939. If it was in the Ukraine border region the postmark seems odd. Thus there was no explanatory caption on page 26. I shall be pleased if I have given any clues you yourself can take forward.

<u>From Alec Page:</u> The Slovakia Monograph 15, page 343 records post office at POZONY-TAKSONY changed in 1911 to TAKSONYFALVA after administration changed to CSR. Czech Monograph 16 II page 254, the 1920-1938 name becomes TAKŠOŇ [Cancellation 1918-20 Taksony Falva]. Czech Monograph 17 II confirms above to 1938 on page 324. On page 151 in Mervyn Benford's book Taksonyfalva is shown as Hungarian with alternative name as Taksan. Conclusions - that TAKSONY certainly in the greater Bratislava area but I cannot find any reference in the Czech Autoatlas (1963) or on the map. Likewise no reference in the latest "PALLAS" guide 1991 [an excellent tourist reference book published as one of a series by PALLAS ATHENE, 59 Linden Gardens, London W2 4HJ, published price £15.95].


Another query from <u>Jim Ansell</u>: This relates to a Russian 5K brown postal stationery card which I obtained by auction, and it was described as Army in Siberia. It is clearly dated both in manuscript >

and by the unidentified Russian Station postmark, 21.3.1918. The stamps added to the card are SG 107A, 110A, and 115dB. I have found it difficult to identify as it is written in pencil, the reverse of the card has what appears to be Ruckr 21/3 written in the top right hand corner.

ПОЧТОВАЯ

<u>From Chris Proctor:</u> I have a cover from Praha 7 dated 17 July 1936 to Hungary, which hopefully someone can identify for me, it was one of three from the same source, all of which have been treated in the same way. The 4 x 25h stamps of the 1929 Arms issue are boxed with blue crayon, although the 1k Masaryk has not been treated thus, so presumably this cover was returned because the stamps were disallowed? There is a Praha arrival datestamp of 20 July 1936, and a green on white label with the Hungarian & French wording "Szabalyellen-s Non règlementaire" cancelled with a datestamp of KOMAROM 18 Jul 36 B2B. The covers apparently never reached Budapest, being returned from the border town of Komárom.

I asked David Williams, Editor of the Hungarian PS of GB Journal, who informed me that this label was unknown to him, and further inquiries amongst their members produced no further information on either the label, or why the covers had been returned to Czechoslovakia.




